




- Patchy fog and some lower clouds/ slightly reduced visibility could be possible for stations North of Morgan's Point however, the better threat for fog doesn't look to return until the ~6-8 PM timeframe tonight.
- For locations South of Morgan's Point, patchy fog/ mist will likely continue into the evening/ overnight hours. The main risk to fog sticking around will be the strength of the winds coming off the Gulf. The wind's impacts on the fog is the lowest confidence part of the forecast. While we are in favor of the fog lingering around S of Morgan's Point in a patchy nature these chances will end ~4 PM timeframe. After that window, fog is favored into the evening / overnight hours.


Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Spotty showers will be possible later in the afternoon and into the evening beginning ~9PM. Better chances likely arrive Monday morning with the passage of a front.
- Winds are anticipated to be out of the SE sustained around 10 – 15 MPH north of Morgan’s Point and 15-20 MPH south of Morgan’s Point.
- Low temperatures tonight will be in low 60s


Sustained Winds (11 PM CT)

Visibility (11 PM CT)






- Fog will once again be favored in the early morning hours across all stations as touched on in the prior slide. Fog for stations south of G would be favored to linger in a patchy nature out through when the cold front passes, while stations north of G likely see any patchy fog wind down around sunrise. With high wind speeds fog will likely be reduced in strength but confidence is low on how much.
- Into the late AM/ early PM, attention will turn to a cold front that will be moving in from our west that will usher in winds from the NW and end the fog threat for a time. We are currently favoring the cold front to reach stations closer to the 610 Bridge by the 10 A – 12 P timeframe, and the boarding station in the 11 A – 1 PM window. This will push the fog threat into the Gulf. Fog will be clear from stations for a time but fog looks to redevelop South of Morgan's Point around the 10PM timeframe


Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Areas of light rain will be likely as the front approaches. The front will likely move in ~11AM-2PM. A t-storm will be associated with this front with moderate rain. Conditions will be dry after frontal passage.
- SE winds at 10-20 MPH will shift SW from midnight to 6AM. Gusts for Monday will be around 25-30 MPH before the front passage. Around the 11-2AM timeframe when the front passes winds will shift NW reducing speed to 5-10 MPH for stations. ~8-10PM winds will shift N.
- High temperatures will be in the upper 60s.


Sustained Winds (12 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (11 AM CT)






Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Tuesday is looking to be a much drier day after the front passage.
- Winds will be out of the N as they slowly shift NE around 3-6AM. Stations north of C are likely to have 3-8 MPH sustained winds. Stations to the south will have 8-13 MPH sustained winds.
- High temperatures Tuesday will be in the mid 60s
- Fog is still in question with light winds and potential fog redevelopment from Monday night. This will be fine tuned as we get closer to the event


Sustained Winds (10 AM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 AM CT)




- The overall pattern persist for the weeks 3/4 timeframe as well. Drier and warmer conditions expected.
