




➤ We continue to eye a \*patchy\* fog threat from Lynchburg Ferries to 51/52 stations potentially starting around the 7-9 PM CT time this evening and ending in the 2-3 AM Sun window. For locations south of 51/52 and to the boarding station, the best window of patchy fog looks to come a bit later starting in the 9-11 PM window and ending closer to 3-4 AM Sunday. Locations north of the Lynchburg Ferries are currently not favored to see fog.

➤ We want to note that thanks to slightly stronger winds, we think any potential development of fog would be rather patchy and not a widespread situation. Latest observed winds are 15-20 MPH sustained which will limit (but may not 100% prevent) the fog threat. If no fog threat develops, this will be because the winds were too strong. Our front will then move through by ~4 AM and shift winds to out of the NW and move the fog threat offshore for the daybreak hours Sunday.


## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- The threat of some scattered sprinkles/ light rain showers will persist until about 2-3 AM Sunday morning but will be in a very hit and miss fashion. Total precip expected to be less than 0.10". An iso rumble of thunder cannot be ruled out but not anticipated.
- Sustained winds will weaken over the next few hours, currently favoring winds across the area of 8-13 MPH with a few localized gusts of 13-18 MPH near the boarding station into the evening and overnight hours. These winds will be coming from the S
- Temps out ahead of the frontal passage will be in the upper 50s to lower 60s


## Sustained Winds (8 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 PM CT)




## Temperatures (5 AM CT Sun)




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- While an isolated sprinkle in the 12A – 3A time window cannot be ruled out with the passing of our front, we are favoring drier weather for the rest of the day on Sunday.
- Frontal boundary should pass around 12-3 AM with winds gradually shifting more out of the NW. In the morning hours, we are favoring sustained winds of 8-13 MPH with gusts of 13-18 MPH possible. Into the afternoon (~2 PM and beyond), winds will increase to sustained out of the NW at 13-18 MPH with gusts of 20-30 MPH possible, locally higher at the boarding station
- High temperatures on Sunday will likely be in the mid to upper 60s closer to the HOU metro, lower 60s for the boarding station
- The front shifting winds from onshore to offshore will eliminate any threat of fog for the daytime hours Sunday


## Sustained Winds (4 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (6 AM CT)




## High Temperatures Sunday




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Monday is expected to be a drier day.
- Winds Monday will continue to come out of the NW, however we expect gradual weakening of the winds during the day. Winds at the boarding station likely start out the day sustained 18-23 MPH with gusts 23-28 MPH. By Noon and through the PM hours, winds calm to 10-15 MPH with gusts 15-20 MPH. Winds will be calmer for our stations closer to the HOU metro
- Expected highs on Monday look to only reach the upper 50s for our stations.
- Fog is not anticipated for the day on Monday


## Sustained Winds (9 AM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)



