




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- The rest of the day will be a quieter day
- Winds the rest of the day today will be sustained 10-15 MPH with locally higher gusts, coming from the SE.
- Temps this evening likely drop back into the upper 40s/ lower 50s across the area
- *Not anticipating fog the rest of the day today.*


Sustained Winds (8 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (9 PM CT)




Temperatures this Evening (11 PM CT)




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- While a very isolated (10%) sprinkle cannot be ruled out in the 1 PM – 6 PM window, the better opportunity for some light and scattered rain chances come Sunday evening out ahead of our next front in the 6 PM – 12 AM window. Overall intensity expected to be light to at times moderate
- Winds will stay coming of the south/ southeast with sustained winds 10-15 MPH with gusts 15-20 MPH. Winds with the upcoming cold front likely don't flip to the N until early Monday AM
- Highs on Sunday should climb back into the middle 60s
- ***** We continue to not favor fog chances Sunday morning. While the conditions become more favorable for fog tomorrow morning, forecasted atmospheric profiles do not suggest fog formation. Low confidence on this part of the forecast and any updates to the forecast will be made into the evening**


Sustained Winds (12 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (7 PM CT)




High Temperatures Sunday







- The potential for fog looks to be increasing Sunday evening with onshore flow out ahead of our cold front. We are favoring Morgan's Point to the boarding station as the stations to have the best chance to be impacted by fog.
- The current favored start time of any fog would likely be in the 8-11 PM window SUN and then wind down in the 2- 5 AM window Monday as the front passes (Morgan's Point likely closer to ~2 AM, boarding station likely closer to ~5 AM). Exact timing of the front will have a big impact on when any fog actually lifts.


Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- After our cold front passes in the early AM hours Monday (2-5 AM), Monday will be dry
- Winds with the front will flip back to Northerly, sustained 10-20 MPH with gusts 20-25 MPH as the front passes and then will gradually diminish as the day goes on.
- Highs on Monday look to sit in the lower 60s
- **No fog is anticipated on the day Monday.**


Sustained Winds (8 AM CT)





Simulated Radar Snapshot (9 AM CT)



High Temperatures Monday





Week 1 Forecast





Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- The next best chance for precipitation looks to come early Monday, however at this distance these chances look rather weak. Temps will stay below average over the next 7 days, however temps will gradually increase moving forward
- Week 2 we are expecting to right around normal temp wise but also drier than normal. The cooler than normal temps will not be what temps over the past few days have been like.
