







- **Guidance has been struggling over the past 12 hours with the fog as models have been too cool with air temperatures over the water, thus leading to an over modeling of fog.**
- **With that said, we still think fog will be possible from now out through the ~7 PM window in a rather patchy fashion for locations S of the Morgan's Point. Beyond the ~7 PM window, we are in favor of fog becoming more widespread and dense across all stations south of Morgan's Point. This fog likely only increases in density and coverage as we head throughout the evening and overnight hours.**
- **Locations of north of Morgan's Point will still hold the potential for fog, however the better potential fog widespread, dense fog exists for Morgan's Point and south. Fog will then persist into the morning hours Thursday as discussed on the next slide.**





- ***We continue to favor dense fog to be around the area for much of the day on Thursday for all stations.***
 - ***One area that may not see *as* persistent of fog are stations from the 610 bridge to Lynchburg. This is not saying that no fog is in the forecast for those locations, however dense fog may not be as persistent nor as widespread in those locations.***
- ***One timeframe to watch on Thursday for *slightly less* potential coverage in the fog across all stations would be late AM – mid PM (~10A – 4P). In this window, fog is still possible, however this period offers up the best shot at seeing any breaks in the fog. Working later into Thursday evening, widespread fog is currently favored***





- ***A touch lower confidence on exact details for Friday, however fog will be favored for Friday across our stations. Guidance does offer hints of breaks of fog during the day with the best potential for fog coming in the late morning and early afternoon hours, but this will need to be fine tuned in the coming days. Until a front looks to work through early next week, fog looks likely to linger around the area throughout the area into the weekend thanks to the onshore flow of warmer air riding over the cooler waters.***


Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **A few rather isolated sprinkles (10-20%) will continue to be possible heading into the evening and overnight hours. Any showers will be very hit and miss**
- **Winds will stay out of the S / SSW the rest of the day with winds of 8-13 MPH with a few gusts 13 - 18 MPH possible**
- **Temperatures this evening likely drop back into the upper 50s over the water, lower 60s inland**


Sustained Winds (8 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (6 PM CT)




Temperatures 11 PM CT




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- We continue to favor scattered light rain shower chances throughout the entire day (~20-30%). While there will be breaks in the rain, confidence is not high enough to say when exactly those breaks may be. Overall intensity of any precip would be on the lighter side.
- Winds will be rather light (5-10 MPH) on Thursday leading to variable direction, however winds look to be generally coming from the E / SE. Winds do look to increase some closer to the sundown timeframe.
- Highs on Thursday look to be in the mid to upper 60s / lower 70s due to low clouds in the area.


Sustained Winds (9 AM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)




High Temperatures Thursday




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Continuing to favor a low end risk (10-20%) risk for sprinkles on the day Friday. The overall better precip potential looks to come N of our stations, but a few sprinkles at this distance cannot be ruled out.
- Winds on Friday will continue to come onshore, sustained 8-13 MPH with gusts 13-18 MPH
- High temps on Friday will hover around the upper 60s


Sustained Winds (10 AM CT)





Simulated Radar Snapshot (12 PM CT)



High Temperatures Friday





Week 1 Forecast




Long-Range Forecast Discussion
