


## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- The rest of the day will be quiet
- Through the rest of the afternoon we are favoring winds to be 8-13 MPH for the boarding station and then likely closer to 5-10 MPH as the sun goes down. Winds will increase near midnight which are touched on in Sunday's slide.
- Temps this evening likely fall back into the lower to mid 50s
- *No fog is currently anticipated for the evening*


## Sustained Winds (6 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (9 PM CT)




## Temperatures this evening (10 PM CT)




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Dry weather is in store for Sunday**
- **Winds on Sunday will make a gradual transition from NE to ESE during the day. Winds start NE, turn more E by ~2 PM, and then more ESE by ~8 PM. In the Midnight – 3 PM window, winds will be stronger near the boarding station. Winds near 610 bridge will be 5-10 MPH for that period while the boarding station look to see sustained winds 13-18 MPH with locally higher gusts. Beyond 3 PM, winds at the boarding station look to be closer to 8-13 MPH**
- **High temps on Sunday will be in the low to mid 60s.**
- ***No fog is anticipated Sunday.***


## Sustained Winds (10 AM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (2 PM CT)




## High Temperatures Sunday




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Continue to expect Monday to be a dry day.
- Winds for Monday will be coming out of the E/SE for much of the day at 8-13 MPH sustained, gusts 13-18 MPH
- Monday's highs will be in the mid 60s over open waters with warmer temperatures further inland.
- *Currently not favoring fog for Monday*
- *We are keeping a closer eye than normal on the fog potential for next week. Onshore flow will be present for much of the upcoming week. While waters have warmed some recently and this may limit the development of fog, winds coming from the SE will at least provide a risk for fog development.*


## Sustained Winds (1 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)








## Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Slightly cooler to near normal temps are expected over the next few days with above normal temperatures expected Tuesday through Friday. Precipitation chances look to be quite
  
- The week 2 timeframe will offer up some better precipitation risks with the best potential just North of the Houston area. In particular, we will need to watch for better chances associated with our 2 storm dates in this timeframe (Mar 10-13 , Mar 14-16). Temps likely start out above normal with some cooler temperatures for the second half of the week (3/14 – 3/18). This likely means temps averaging out right around normal for the 3/12 – 3/18 window.
  
- The end of March is expected to have near normal precipitation risks with slightly above normal temperature risks. The last week of MAR can see some periods of drier weather with better opportunity for more active weather coming the first week of APR.
