


## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Similar to yesterday, a few isolated sprinkles/mist cannot be ruled out through today, but we favor overall drier weather through the day
- Today likely features sustained winds of 13-18 MPH and gusts 20-25 MPH coming from the SSE at the boarding station.
- Highs will be in the upper 60's F to lower 70's F over open waters, warmer inland.
- *Check the slide below for reduced visibility risks.*


## Sustained Winds (10 AM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (12 PM CT)









- **Throughout the daytime hours today, widespread fog is not anticipated. However a few pockets of reduced visibility will be possible under a pocket of mist or a patchy lower cloud deck.**
- **As touched on in the past couple reports, winds look to be a factor with fog development. Winds have stayed up enough recently to limit the fog threat up to this point, but a slight relax in winds could allow for pockets of reduced visibility to at least be possible. Lower confidence will continue given the forecasted conditions. The best opportunities for fog will come into early Friday which is touched on more in the Friday fog slide.**


## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Expecting Friday at this distance to be on the drier side. <10% chance of an iso sprinkle
- Winds look to be very similar to the past few days, coming from the SE at 10-15 MPH with gusts 15-20 MPH possible at the boarding station.
- Temperatures will continue to sit in the lower 70s over the waters, closer to 80 inland.
- *Watching Fri AM fog potential as touched on in the slide above.*


## Sustained Winds (2 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (5 PM CT)








➤ **Continuing to keep an eye on the development of fog as we work into Friday morning. Right now we are favoring for reduced visibility to set in for locations S of Morgan's Point beginning around ~3-6 AM Fri and can linger through the morning. Beyond ~6 AM is likely when we have better opportunities present themselves for fog for stations N of Morgan's Point**

➤ **Lower confidence on exact timing and development for 3 reasons. Guidance continues to be very split on visibility timing, our waters have warmed recently which is less favorable for fog, and winds have been overall above 10 MPH which usually helps limit fog. Stronger winds vs modeled = less fog, weaker winds = more fog. We will continue to fine tune this time period and the risks as we get closer.**


## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Once again given the onshore flow and moisture being brought into the area, a few isolated showers will be possible during the daytime hours. Any precipitation would be quite light.**
- **Anticipating sustained winds of 13-18 MPH and gusts 20-25 MPH coming from the SE at the boarding station for Saturday.**
- **Highs will progress into the lower 70s over water, lower 80s inland**
- ***Details on fog will need to be refined, but at this distance it does look possible that the morning hours of Sat feature patchy fog. More details to come***


## Sustained Winds (11 AM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (11 AM CT)








## Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Temps are expected to be above normal for much of the next 7 days. Precipitation chances look to be mainly north over the next week.
- The week 2 timeframe will offer up some better precipitation risks with the best potential just North / East of the Houston area. Temperatures will likely drop below normal for this period.
- The end of March and open to early April is expected to have near below normal precipitation risks with slightly above normal temperature risks.
