


## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Dry weather anticipated through the rest of the day.**
  
- **Winds for the rest of the day will be coming from the E at 8-13 MPH with gusts to 15 MPH. Expecting a full wind shift to more SE near the late afternoon hours (4-6 PM). Winds will then be out of the SE for the remainder of the evening and increase to 10-15 MPH.**
  
- **Low temps look to drop back to the lower 60s for our stations.**
  
- ***No fog expected the rest of the day today.***


## Sustained Winds (7 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (6 PM CT)




## Low Temps this evening




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- While a few isolated sprinkles/ very light rain showers will be possible beginning near sunrise Monday, the better chances look to come during the afternoon/evening hours, most notably after ~5 PM. A few iso rumbles of thunder Monday evening cannot be ruled out. Precip looks to stay generally light to at times moderate
- Winds across the area will continue coming out of the SE and will increase throughout the day. Into the afternoon hours of Monday, sustained winds of 13-18 MPH with gusts 18-23 MPH will be possible. A locally stronger wind gust will be possible with the passing of precip Monday evening.
- Highs Monday should be sitting in the lower 70s
  - *Fog is currently not favored for Monday.*


## Sustained Winds (3 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 PM CT)






## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Scattered showers and a few iso rumbles of thunder will be possible through the first half of Tuesday. The back half of Tuesday looks to stay on the quieter side, lower confidence on exact exit timing of precip.**
- **Winds will be a bit tricky on Tuesday. Winds before 4 AM will be coming from the SSE at 8-13 MPH. Beyond this, a cold front will try and work its way toward the coast coming from the N, but then stalls right near the coastline. Winds may turn N for a very brief period of time Tuesday early PM, but then turn more SE into the evening at 5-10 MPH.**
- **Highs will be sitting in the lower 70s Tuesday, warmer inland**
  - *No fog is expected for Tuesday. Guidance at this distance is hinting at fog potential Wed AM, something that will be refined in coming reports*


## Sustained Winds (1 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 AM CT)








## Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Cooler temperatures this weekend moderate on Monday with temperatures near normal. Monday – Wednesday will offer up the best shots of moisture this week with with heavier downpours/ storms possible.
  
- Temperatures likely average out to near normal for the week 2 timeframe with warmer weather out ahead of a system on Mar 29 – 31 and cooler temps in behind. Precipitation should run near normal as well with better moisture chances with the storm system around Mar 29 – 31.
  
- The end of March/ early April will feature a more active subtropical jet with increased moisture risk. Temperatures are expected to be near normal and likely fluctuate between warmer and cooler pending passages of systems.
