




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- We are continuing to favor scattered showers to continue across the area out through about ~11 PM tonight. An isolated rumble of thunder will continue to be possible, but severe weather is not anticipated.
- Winds the next several hours at the boarding station will be 20-25 MPH with gusts 25-30 MPH coming from the ESE. Beyond the ~8 PM window, winds will drop back to 10-15 MPH and will shift more to a southerly wind.
- Temps this evening until drop back into the upper 60s across the area


Sustained Winds (7 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 PM CT)




Temperatures this Evening






Above Normal

- **Low clouds/ mist will continue to be possible out throughout the ~7-9 PM window before chances increase for more reduced visibility thanks to patchy fog. The patchy fog would work in SE to NW, meaning the boarding station is likely to see fog first and then progress North.**
- **Fog into Thursday morning is likely to end by 8 AM THU for our Northern stations, closer to 11 AM for the boarding station as our cold front will work through the area. Beyond this, fog is not expected into the afternoon hours Thursday.**


Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **A few scattered showers/t-storms will be possible from ~7 AM out through about 11 AM when the cold front passes through. A very isolated strong storm cannot be ruled out, but think this would be quite isolated. Beyond this, drier weather expected for Thursday**
- **Winds will start the day coming out of the S coming at 13-18 MPH, but the passing of a cold front in the 8-11 AM window (8A North, 11A closer to boarding station) will shift winds from the NW. Gusts of 20-30 MPH will be possible with the passing of the front. Winds will then gradually weaken throughout the day.**
 - **High temps will be in the lower to mid 70s.**
- ***Any reduced visibility Thu AM is favored to fade by 11 AM. More details on the slide above.***


Sustained Winds (11 AM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (8 AM CT)




High Temperatures Thursday




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Currently favoring a drier day on Friday**
- **Winds will be calm early Friday morning but will gradually increase throughout the day. After a brief period of offshore flow in the AM, onshore will re-introduce itself on Friday evening with winds 10-15 MPH with gusts 15-20 MPH possible**
- **Highs will be sitting in the lower to mid 70s for Friday, warmer inland.**
- ***Currently not favoring fog for Friday***


Sustained Winds (1 PM CT)

High Temperatures Friday





Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Above normal temperatures for this period overall, but some ups and downs remain possible. Heavier rainfall potential looks to stay just to the north with the best rain chances coming into Thursday.



- Increasing high pressure to the north and a late March front could open the door for seasonable to slightly cooler temperatures for the week 2 timeframe. Some subtropical jet influence should allow for normal rainfall potential in this timeframe.

- Early April will feature a more active subtropical jet with increased moisture risk. Temperatures are expected to be near normal and likely fluctuate between warmer and cooler pending passages of systems.
