




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- A few scattered showers will be possible from ~7 AM out through about 11 AM when the cold front passes through. A very isolated thunderstorms cannot be ruled out, but think this would be quite isolated. Beyond this, drier weather expected for the back half of the day
- We will start seeing our winds shift more NW over the coming hours. Anticipating the front to work through our N stations around 8 AM, closer to the boarding station around 10 AM. Gusts of 20-30 MPH will be possible with the passing of the front. Winds will then gradually weaken throughout the day. By sundown, winds coming from the NW at 5-10 MPH expected
 - High temps will be in the lower to mid 70s.
- *Any reduced visibility is favored to fade this morning. More details on the slide below.*


Sustained Winds (2 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (9 AM CT)




High Temperatures Today




Fog Report



➤ ***Any fog/reduced visibility this morning is likely to end by 8 AM CT for our Northern stations, closer to 10 AM for the boarding station as our cold front will work through the area. Beyond this, fog is not expected into the afternoon hours Thursday as our winds will shift more NW.***


Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Currently favoring a drier day on Friday**
- **Winds will be calm before daybreak Friday morning but will gradually increase throughout the day. After a brief period of offshore flow in the AM, onshore will re-introduce itself on Friday evening with winds 13-18 MPH with gusts 18-23 MPH possible. Winds start the early morning coming out of the N, but look to turn more NE by ~4 AM. Winds then turn more E by mid morning and then more SE into mid-afternoon.**
- **Highs will be sitting in the lower to mid 70s for Friday, warmer inland.**
- ***Currently not favoring fog for Friday.***


Sustained Winds (1 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (4 PM CT)




High Temperatures Friday




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Favoring Saturday to be drier for our stations with the better potential of seeing moisture looking to stay north
- Winds Saturday will continue coming out of the SE at 13-18 MPH with gusts 18-23 MPH
- High Temps on Saturday will be in the mid 70s across the area
- *Details will certainly need to be refined, but another round of fog looks possible late Friday night into the morning hours of Saturday.*


Sustained Winds (6 PM CT)

High Temperatures Saturday





Week 1 Forecast

Long-Range Forecast Discussion



➤ Above normal temperatures for this period overall, but some ups and downs remain possible. Another round of rain looks to work through Sunday into Monday

➤ Increasing high pressure to the north and a late March front could open the door for seasonable to slightly cooler temperatures for the week 2 timeframe. Some subtropical jet influence should allow for normal rainfall potential in this timeframe.

➤ Early April will feature a more active subtropical jet with increased moisture risk. Temperatures are expected to be near normal and likely fluctuate between warmer and cooler pending passages of systems.
