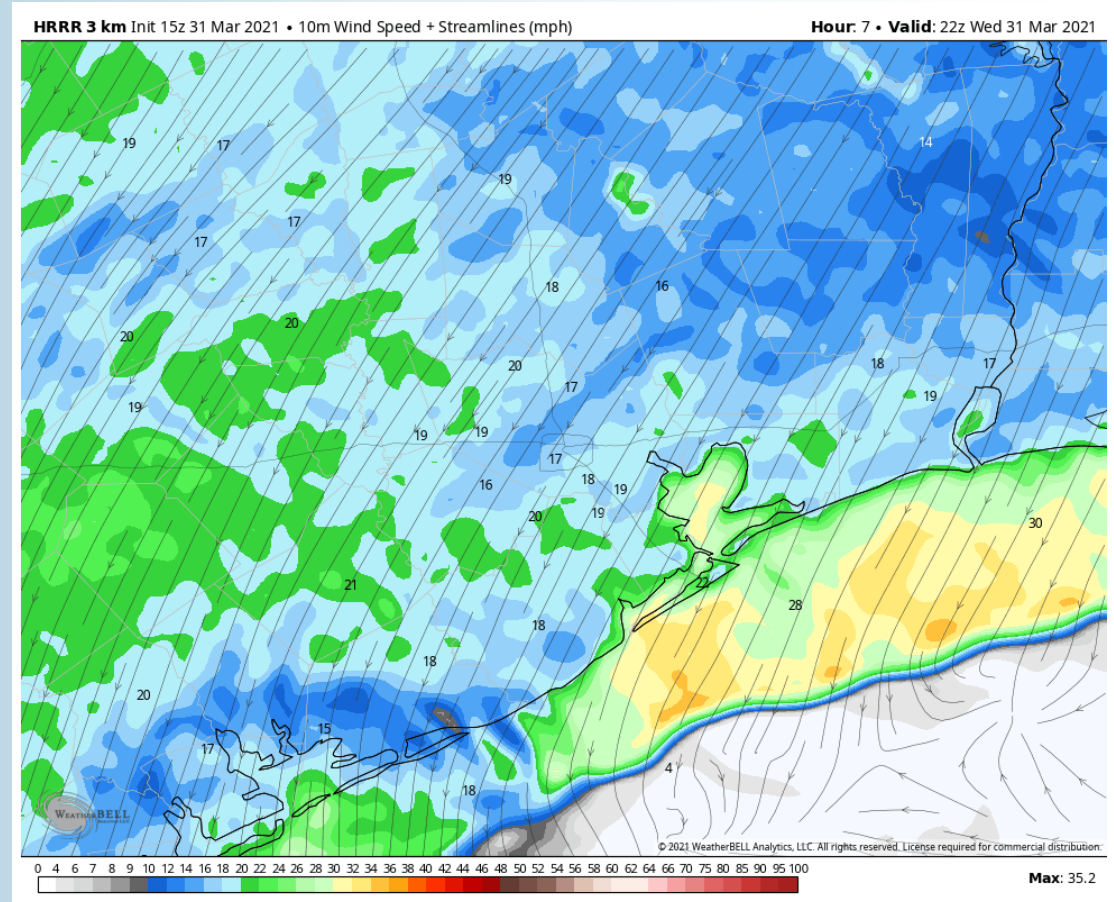

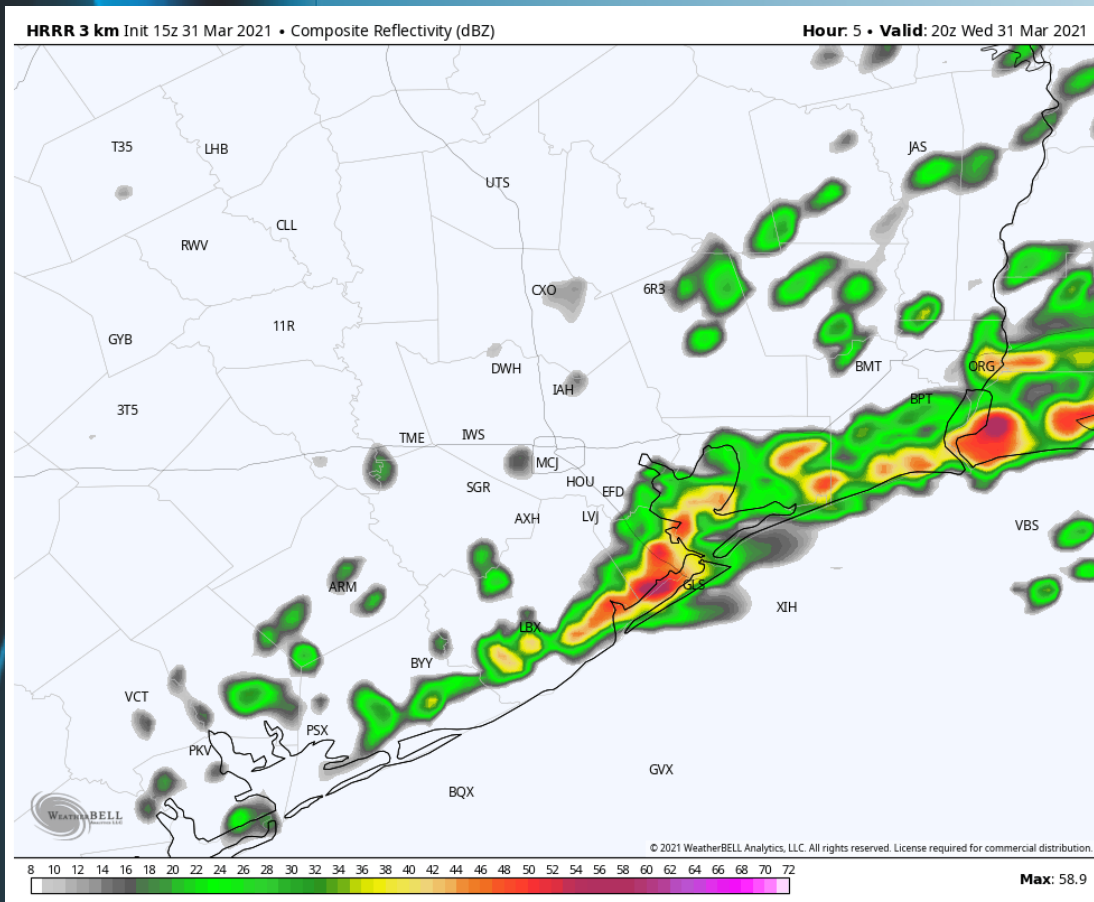
## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- A cold front is situated just north of the Houston area (as of 11:45 AM CDT). This is expected to continue to shift south over the next few hours with thunder and lightning being possible. The best shot of moisture from this will be from 2 PM – 7 PM. Spotty chances persist through about midnight.
- Light winds from the south will continue to remain the theme until the front passes. Winds really begin to pick up around the 3 PM – 4 PM timeframe as the winds shift from the NNE. Winds look to be sustained around 20 – 25 (locally stronger is possible near the Boarding Station) MPH with gust of 35 – 40 MPH possible. Winds continue to remain elevated for the remainder of the day.
- Low temperatures into tomorrow morning look to get into the lower 50's F to upper 40's F.
- *Patchy fog will be possible out through about 1-2 PM for the Boarding station before the front passes. As it does the threat ends for the Bay areas.*

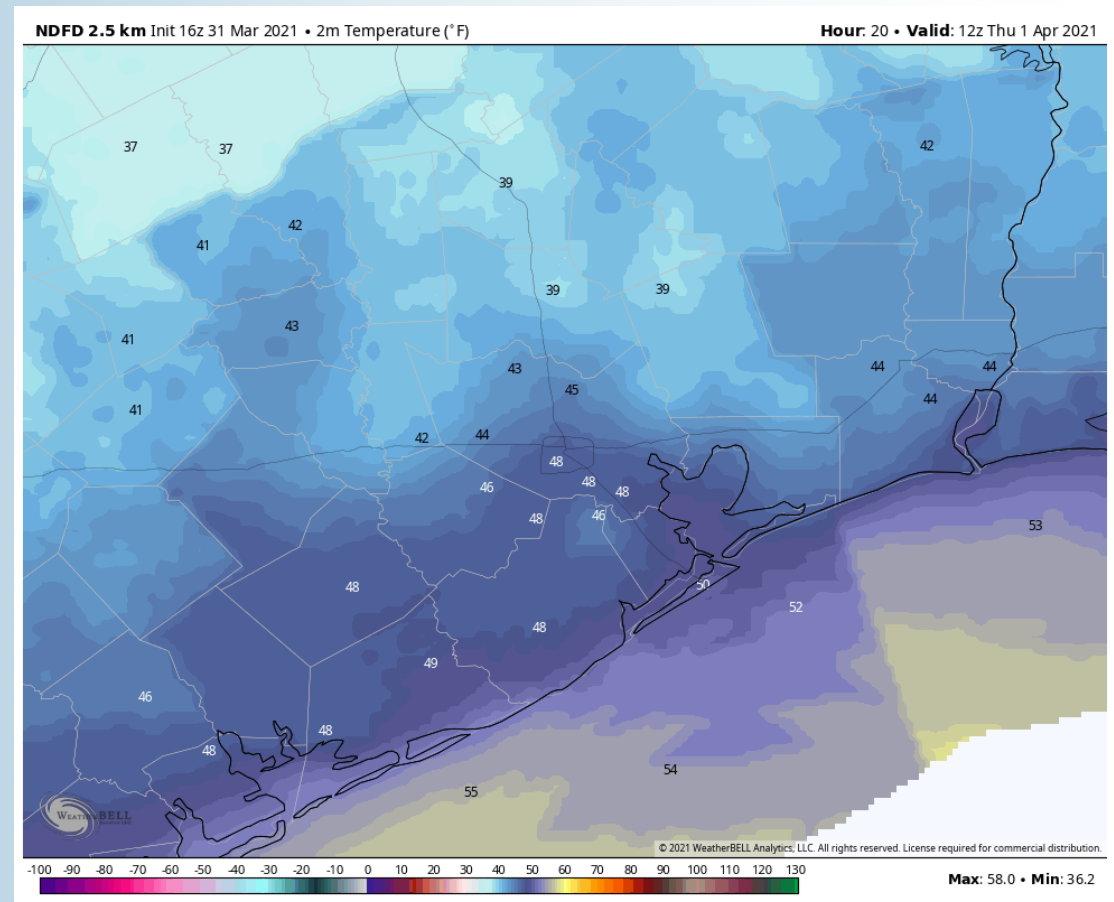
## Sustained Winds (5 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)



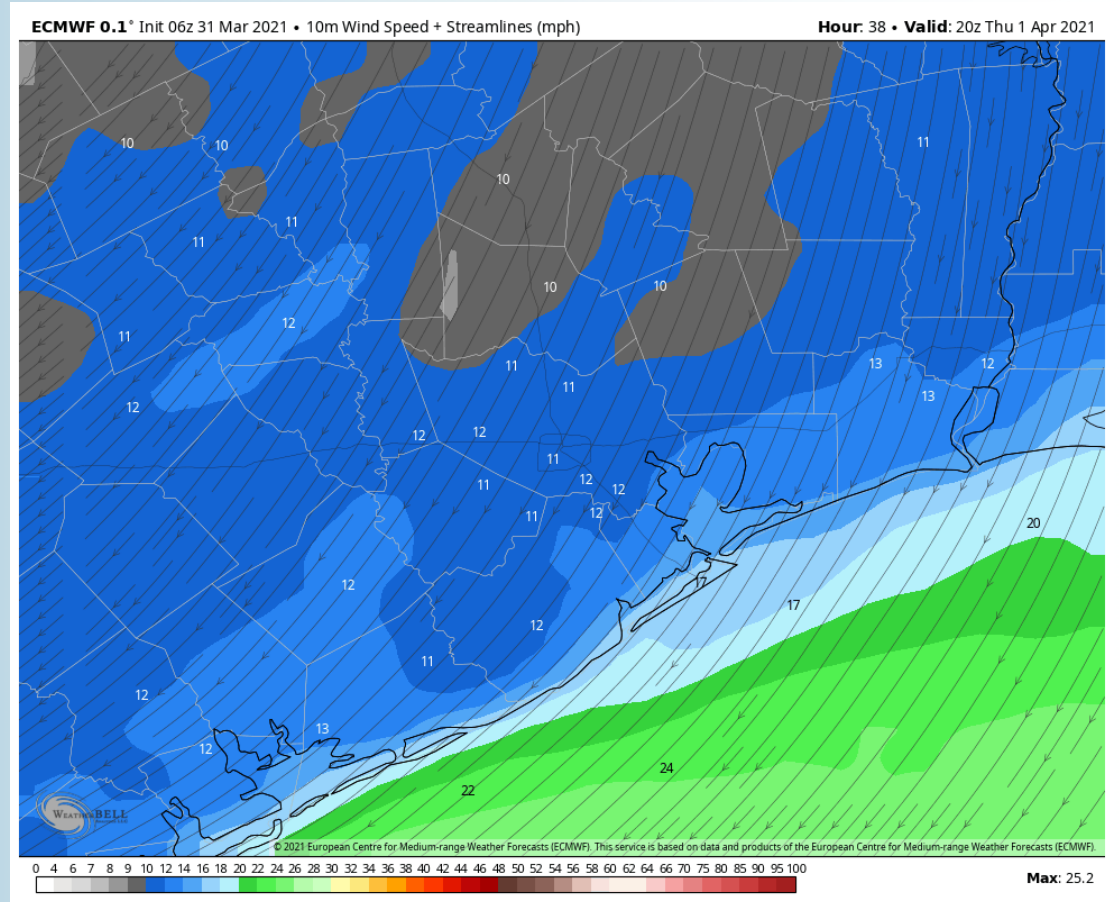
## Low Temperatures into Tomorrow Morning.



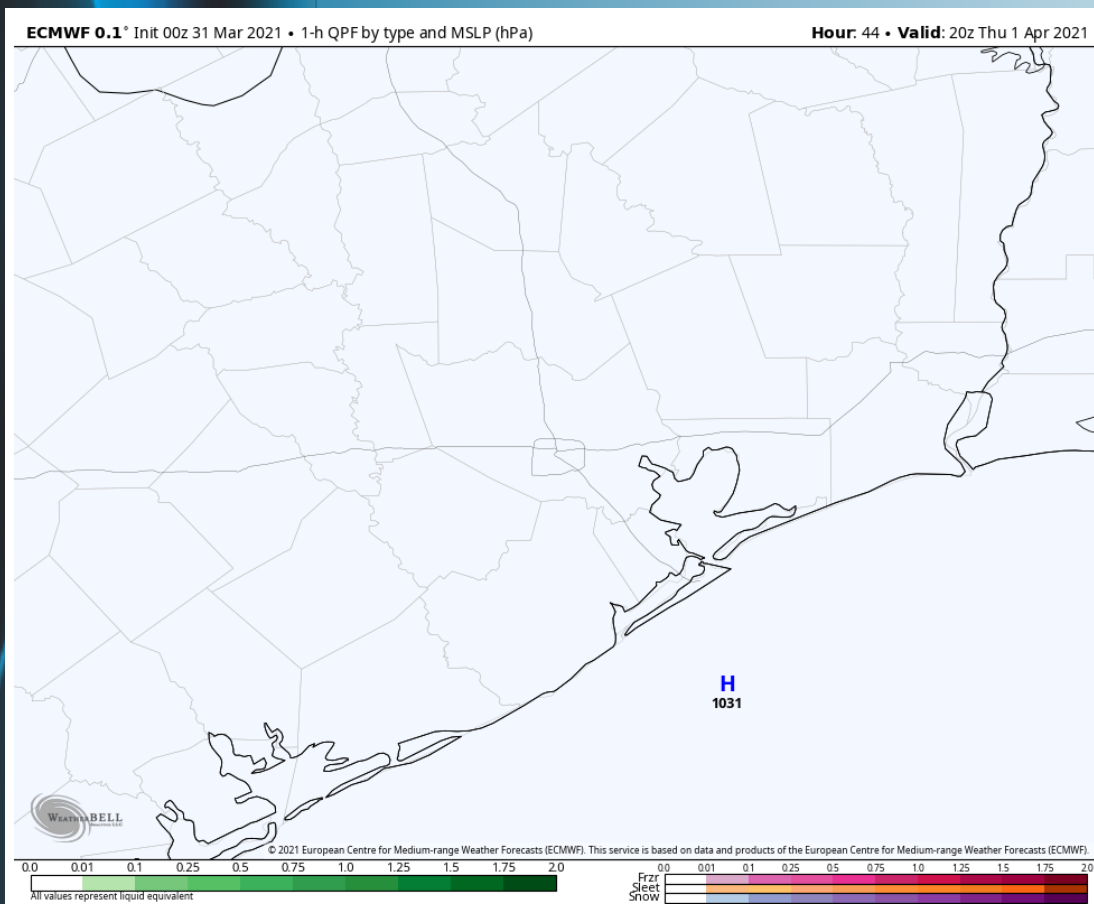
## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Thursday is anticipated to be a dry day, with high pressure overhead. The forecast, overall, into the weekend looks to remain dry for the area as well.
- Wind continue to remain out of the NE throughout the day on THUR. Winds will slowly be decreasing into the afternoon, continuing to remain sustained around 15 – 25 MPH in the morning before weakening to 10 – 15 MPH in the afternoon. Gust of 25 – 35 MPH will be possible in the AM (locally stronger possible, especially earlier in the AM) before gust weakens to around 20 MPH into the afternoon.
- High temperatures look to dip down to the low to mid 60s F over the Boarding Stations on Thursday.
- ***Not expecting fog on Thursday night at this time.***

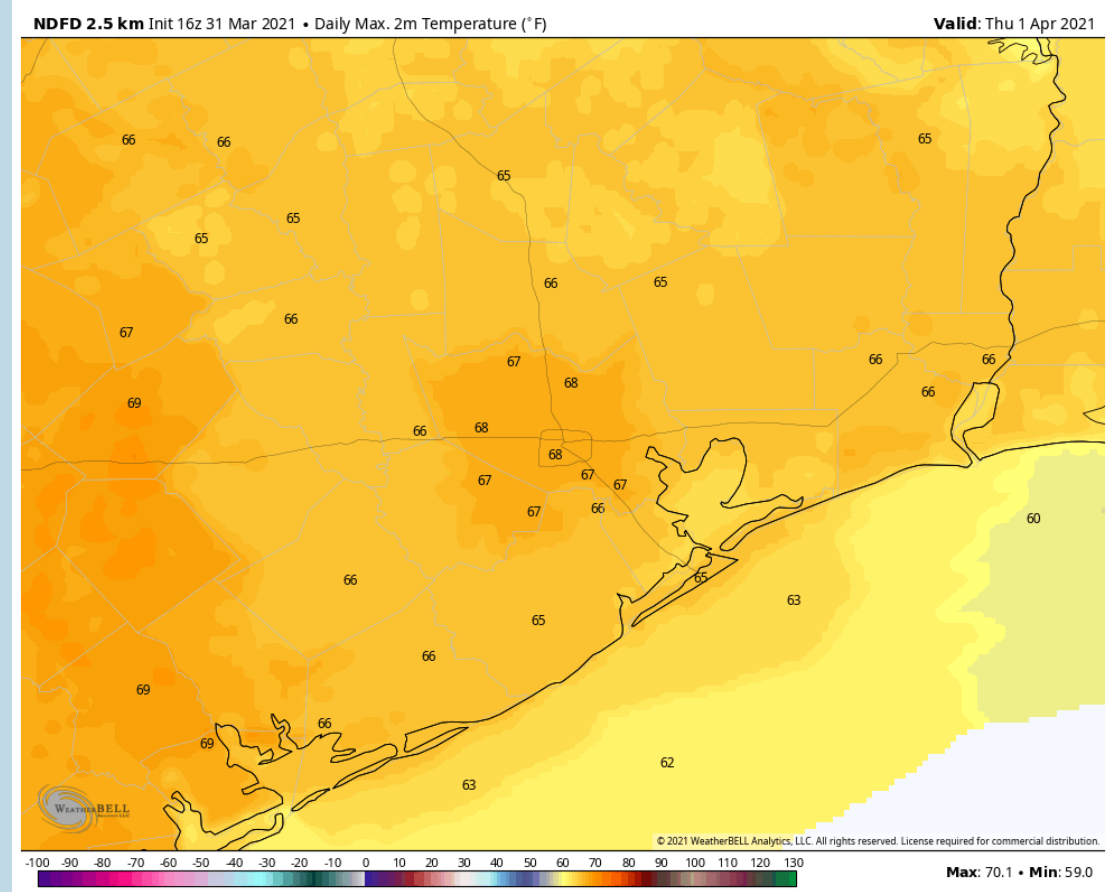
## Sustained Winds (3 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)



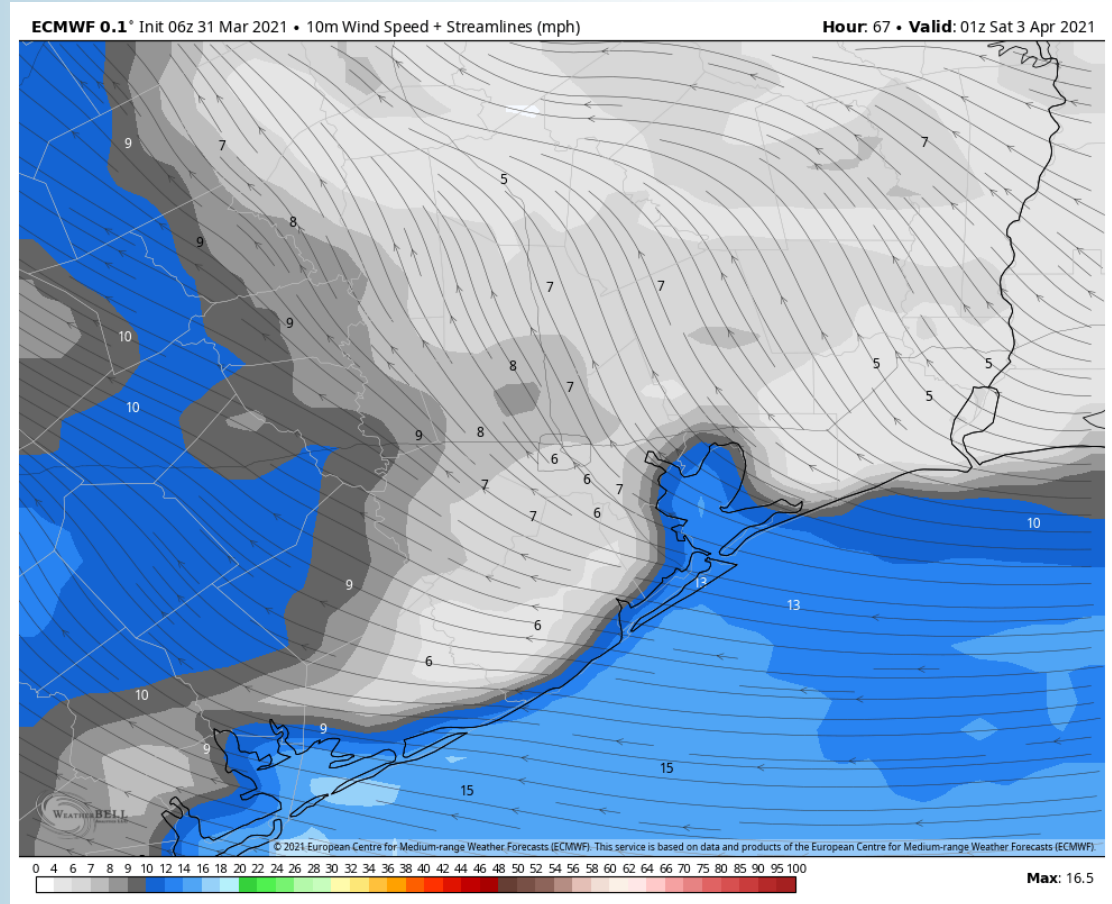

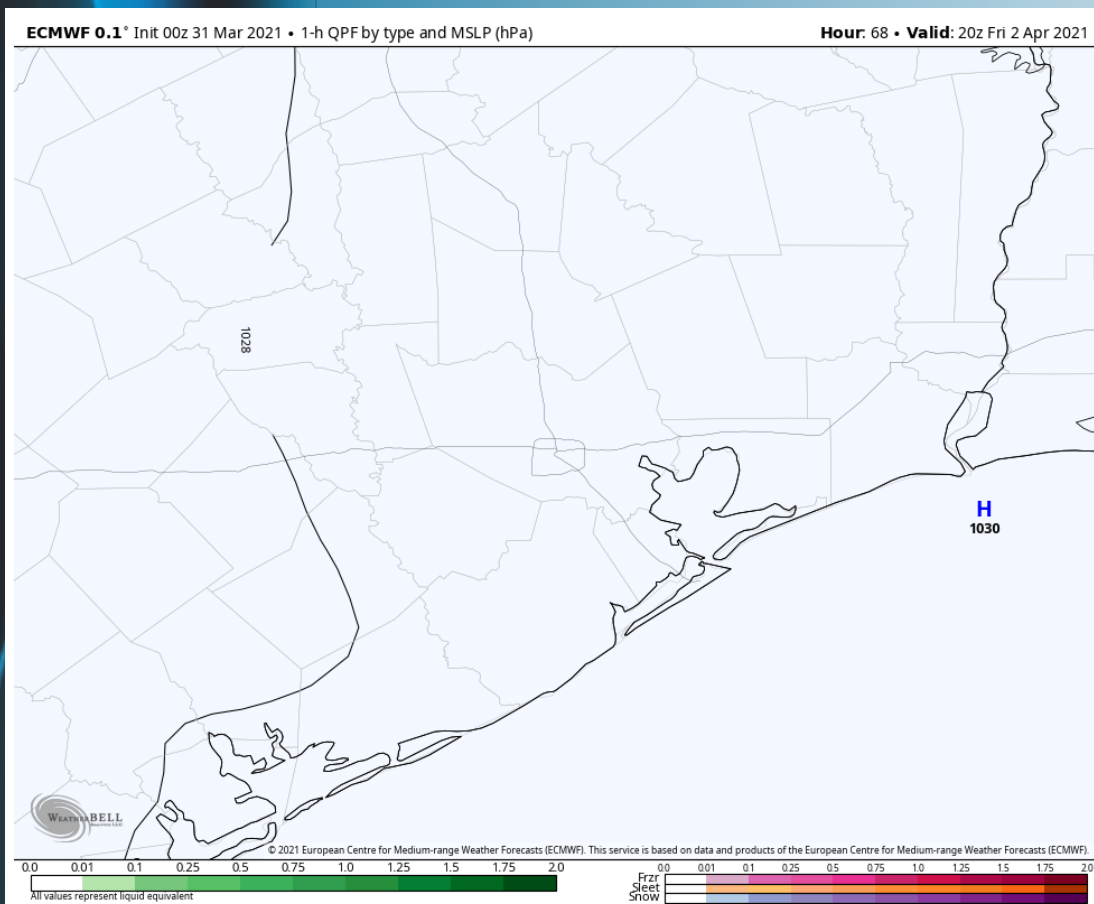
## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Friday is anticipated to be a dry day, with high pressure overhead. The forecast, overall, into the weekend looks to remain dry for the area as well.
- Winds shift from out of the ENE in the morning to the ESE into the PM hours on Friday at 13-18 MPH sustained, gusting at times up to 20-25 MPH.
- High temperatures look to dip down to the low 60s F over the Boarding Stations on Friday.
- *Not expecting fog on Friday night at this time.*

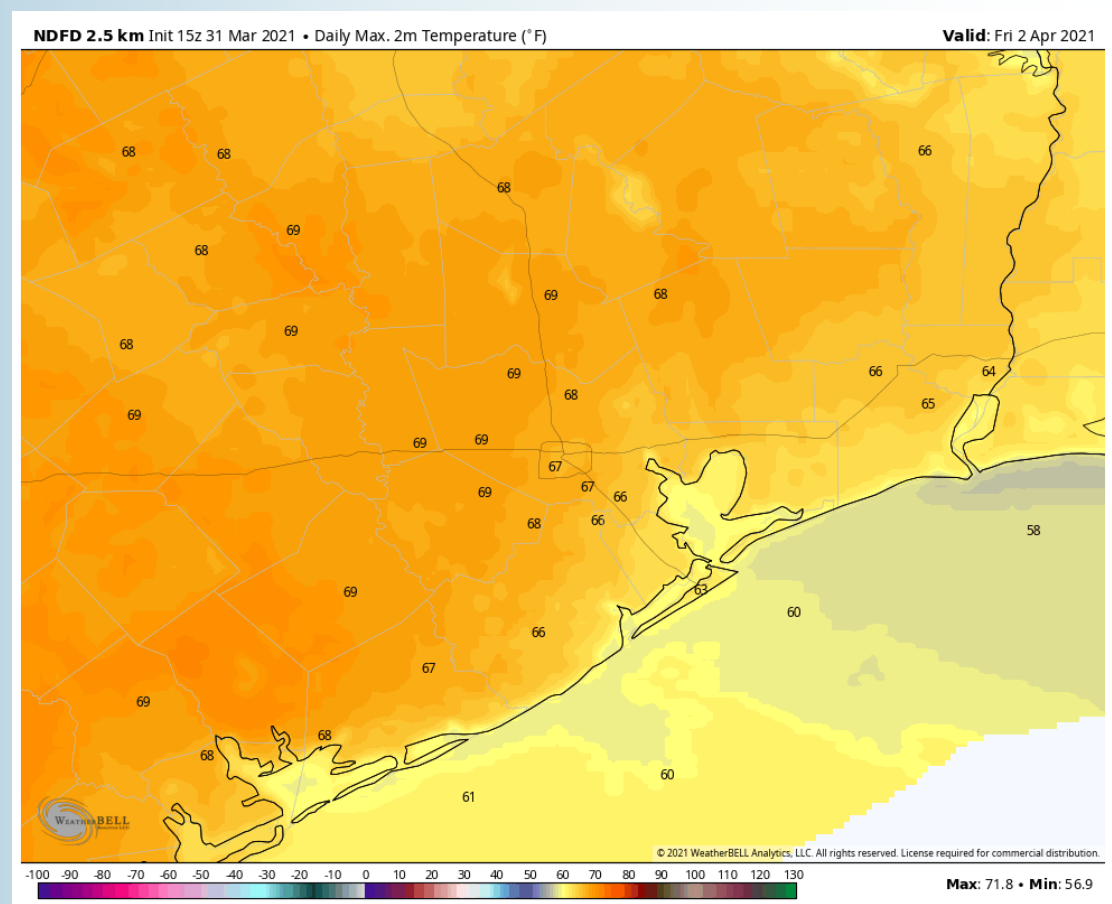
## Sustained Winds (8 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)



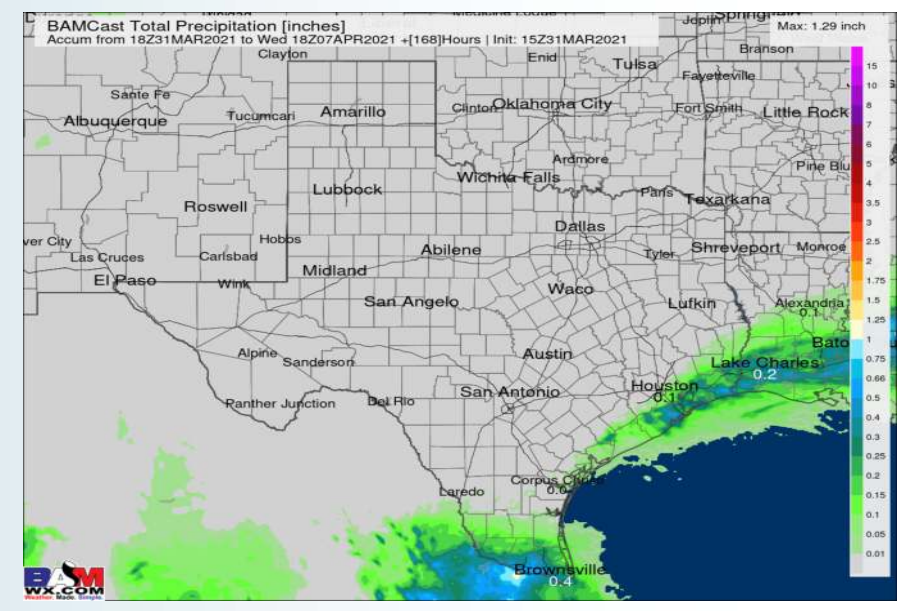
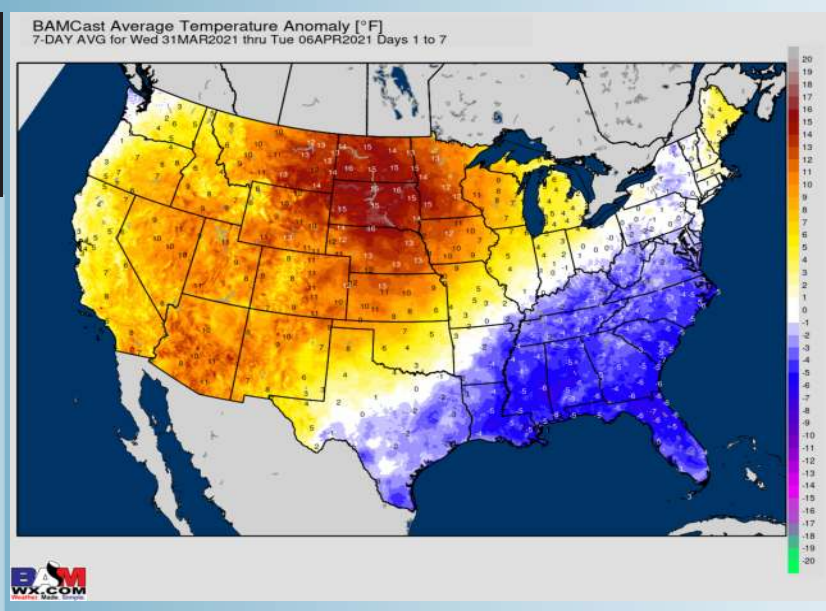

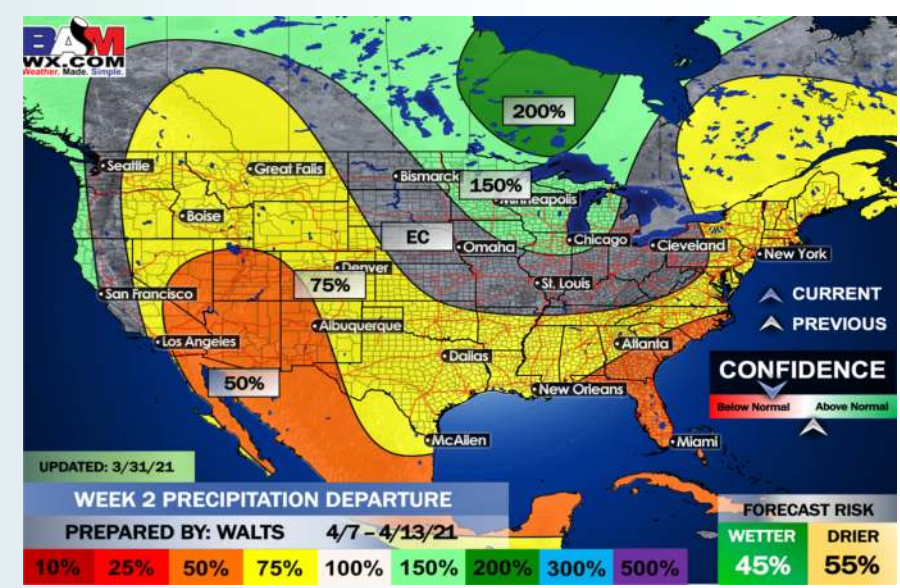
## Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- With the cold front passing today, the next few days look to be on the cooler side. Temperatures look to be on the increase SUN – WED. Outside of the cold front today, precipitation chances will be lack luster the next 7 days.
- The Houston area is anticipated to have above normal temperatures for the week 2 timeframe. We have trended drier in the southern plains with a less subtropical jet influence. There does exist lower confidence in the precipitation forecast in week 2 however.
- Expectations are for a below normal pattern for precipitation risk for the Houston area for weeks 3 + 4. Temperatures are anticipated to average out to near normal for this time frame.
