


## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Favoring our low cloud deck/ mist to be around for the next few hours before better moisture chances pick up into the late afternoon and evening hours (~5 PM and beyond). While an isolated heavier downpour isn't entirely off the table, precip looks to stay scattered and on the lighter side. Rain/mist chances likely end very early tomorrow AM as our front passes through.
- Sustained winds of 13 - 18 MPH with gusts 15-20 MPH possible out through sundown. Winds then shift to Southerly near ~8 PM. Our front has sped up a touch where we are favoring the front to pass in the 10 PM – 12 AM window.
- Lows tonight look to drop back into the lower to mid 60s
- *No fog currently expected today, but reduced visibility via mist/low cloud deck/ precipitation will be certainly be possible*


## Sustained Winds (5 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (6 PM CT)




## Low Temps this Evening




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- The main frontal boundary should already be off to the south into tomorrow morning. However, some spotty chances (10 – 20%) will be possible tomorrow morning with an isolated rumble of thunder possible. Chances will increase into the afternoon (around 40%) and will persist into the evening hours. Still of uncertainty on exact timing, but chances look to persist through midnight.
  - Winds should be from the north through the day with the passage of the cold front. Winds look to be breeziest in the AM hours, generally sustained around 10 – 20 MPH with gust around 30 MPH possible. Winds are anticipate to weaken a bit, still generally sustained around 10 – 20 MPH, with gust around 25 MPH. Winds will gradually weaken into the overnight, especially into locations closer to the Buffalo Bayou.
  - High Temperatures are expected to get into the mid to upper 60's F over open waters.
- **No fog expected on Saturday.**


## Sustained Winds (4 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)




## High Temperatures Saturday




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Drier conditions expected Sunday**
- **Winds will continue coming out of the N/ NW Sunday and will be 15-20 MPH sustained in the morning hours before gradually calming to 10-15 MPH with gusts 15-20 MPH into the afternoon.**
- **Temps tonight look to sit near 70 across our stations.**
- ***No fog expected for Sunday***


## Sustained Winds (10 AM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (7 PM CT)





## High Temperatures Sunday




## Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Temperatures will be well below normal over the next week. Some additional chances over the next few days through Saturday evening before becoming less active into next week.
- The week 2 period should feature cooler air to start and then moderating temperatures as time progresses. The pattern may start to become more active in this period as the pattern warms up.
- We expect that a warmer pattern develops as we work into May with the potential for drier risks to re-establish under a ridge of high pressure.
