




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Wednesday is expected to be a dry day across the area with any precip staying well offshore.
- Winds will gradually weaken throughout the day while continuing out of the N/NE. The next few hours will see a sustained wind of 18-23 MPH, weakening to 13-18 MPH by ~10 AM with gusts locally higher. This evening looking to see more 8-13 MPH sustained winds.
- Highs will sit in the mid 70s over the open water, slightly warmer inland.
 - *No fog expected today.*


Sustained Winds (10 AM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 AM CT)




High Temperatures Today




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Thursday is also expected to be a dry day across the area.
- Winds Thursday will start out 10-15 MPH sustained out of the NE in the morning, decreasing to 5-10 MPH into the PM hours.
- Highs will sit in the mid to upper 70s over the open water, warmer inland.
 - *No fog expected Thursday.*


Sustained Winds (11 AM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (11 AM CT)




High Temperatures Thursday




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Friday is anticipated to be dry as well**
 - **Winds Friday will shift NE to SE during the day, NE for much of the morning at 8-13 MPH, Easterly by Noon, and then more Southeasterly by mid-afternoon**
 - **Highs Friday will continue to stay in the mid to upper 70s with the warmest overall temps over land**
- ***No fog expected Friday***


Sustained Winds (6 PM CT)

High Temperatures Friday





Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Near normal temps expected over the next week, moisture risks look rather limited and further off to the northeast.




- The weeks ³/₄ (Mid/Late May) period likely features more above normal temperatures and above normal moisture, similar to our current week 2 thoughts.
