



**Guidance continues to suggest that we will see formation of a weak tropical system in the Southern portion of the Gulf in the June 15-18<sup>th</sup> window and will slowly progress its way North. We are still a bit too far out for exact details for the Houston area, but a few pieces of model guidance (as shown above) do work this into the Western Gulf Coast during the June 18-22 timeframe we have been targeting. We will continue to keep a close eye on this, but chances have slightly increased regarding the potential of seeing some sort of tropical activity in the Western Gulf sometime ~next weekend. One thing to note is how the GEFS track are further to the east with the Euro Ensemble tracks are further to the west.**




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Dry conditions continue for the remainder of the day today.
- Calm winds pick up only slightly into the afternoon / evening. Winds this afternoon look to be in the 5 – 15 MPH range. Winds slowly shift more SW throughout the overnight.
- Temperatures only drop to near 80 F over open waters into tomorrow morning..
  - **No fog anticipated Saturday.**


## Sustained Winds (11 AM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 PM CT)




## Low Temperatures Sun Morning




## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- **Very isolated showers are possible tomorrow through about 10 AM. Isolated storms continue to remain possible in the afternoon, especially after 3 PM.**
  
- **Winds will begin to shift out of the west in the early AM hours of Sunday and last though about 4 PM. Winds during this time should be rather light, sustained around 5 – 10 MPH. After ~2-4PM winds begin to shift more out of the SW for the remainder of the evening with winds around 5 – 15 MPH (stronger of winds closer to the boarding station).**
  
- **High Temps will be once again upper 80s to lower 90s, warmer inland.**
  
- ***No Fog anticipated Sunday.***


## Sustained Winds (7 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (7 PM CT)






## Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Isolated showers cannot be ruled out in the AM. Isolated-scattered storms will be possible in the afternoon hours of Monday. Any activity likely wanes with the loss of daylight.
- The winds on Monday take a clockwise turn throughout the day with winds initially out of the SW to start to day, and rotating from the north, then SSE throughout the day. Winds expected to be around the 5 – 10 MPH range.
- High temps look to get into the upper 80's F to lower 90's F over open waters.
  - ***Not expecting fog Monday.***


## Sustained Winds (6 PM CT)



## Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)







## Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Temperatures over the next few days look to run near normal to even slightly above normal. Scattered chances come back into the picture Monday with daily chances next week. Precip chances start to increase heading into next weekend.
  
- Week 2 is anticipated to be an active stretch of weather for the HOU with temperatures running slightly below normal. We will also need to keep an eye on tropical mischief arises in the week 2 timeframe as well. Regardless, above normal precipitation is anticipated.
  
- The weeks 3/4 (mid to late June) period likely features more cooler than normal temperatures and above normal moisture, similar to our current week 2 thoughts.
