

Tropical Update:




While there continues to be no immediate tropical threats to Houston, we are keeping an eye on a loosely organized wave located about 10° N 40° W. This wave does look to hold the potential to become a named system and move toward the Caribbean. Details beyond this become much more muddled, so we'd encourage checking back as this does hold at least the possibility of working into the Gulf. *IF* this wave were to work into the Eastern Gulf, it would likely be around July ~7th.


Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Hit and miss rounds of precipitation will continue to be possible the rest of the afternoon and early evening hours. Working ~sundown and beyond, something isolated into the overnight cannot be ruled out but think there will be much more dry time.
- Winds look to be around 8-13 MPH sustained out of the ESE, a few gusts up to 13-18 MPH can't be ruled out. A few locally stronger wind gusts cannot be ruled out within the heaviest of precipitation.
- Temps look to hover around the upper 70s/ lower 80s.
 - *No fog is anticipated this evening.*


Sustained Winds (9 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (8 PM CT)




Low Temps This Evening




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- Expecting lower coverages of precipitation at this distance for Thursday vs today (Wednesday). Something isolated will be possible out through ~2 PM, but think there will be many more drier hours vs wet to start the day. Beyond ~2 PM is when coverage may pick up a touch and chances look to increase to ~30%.
- Winds Thursday look to be around 5-10 MPH sustained out of the ESE. Watching the late afternoon hours for winds to shift a bit more out of the SE.
- Thursday's temps look to hover around the mid/upper 80s once again, warmer inland.
 - *No fog is favored for Thursday.*


Sustained Winds (5 PM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (3 PM CT)




High Temps Thursday




Short-Term Forecast Discussion

- A front looks to work into the area Friday (lower confidence on exact timing) that will hold the potential of bringing additional scattered showers and a few thunderstorms around the area.
 - Early Friday morning our winds look to be coming out of the S at 5-10 MPH, before shifting more SW by mid morning. Lower confidence exists beyond this based on how our front/boundary plays out, but we currently think winds can flip N for a brief period Friday PM for most stations.
 - Friday's temps will be similar, highs in the mid to upper 80s for most stations, lower 90s further inland.
- *No fog expected Friday.*


Sustained Winds (3 AM CT)



Simulated Radar Snapshot (10 AM CT)





High Temperatures Friday





Long-Range Forecast Discussion

- Temperatures look to run at right about normal to slightly below normal over the next 7 days. Early this week we are in favor of a more of an active pattern with increased chances, decreasing chances in the latter part of the week.
- Week 2 is anticipated to continue to be active in precipitation, with temps staying overall below normal across the area.
- The weeks ³/₄ (mid to late July essentially) period likely features more seasonable to cooler than normal temperatures, while precipitation looks to continue running above normal in this period as well.
